## From the Superintendent

### Ty Sparks

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In 2008, GWISD developed a comprehensive 3-Phase Master Plan that would allow all of the identified facility improvements for the District to be prioritized and implemented with three separate bond projects. Approval of Phase I, in 2008, produced various upgrades and new facilities addressing the greatest needs on each campus. Phase II, in 2011, constructed a new high school instructional facility.

Phase III, scheduled for the Fall of 2015, will now provide for a new band hall and gymnasium at the high school. Also included, will be a new classroom wing for the elementary school to replace the aging exterior north wing and provide better security for that campus. The plan also includes improvement for the main cafeteria, the primary school cafeteria, and upgrades to the sidewalks and disabled seating at the football stadium.

The new Student Activity Center, adjacent to the high school, will include a new performance stage, sounds system and theater lighting. This center will be used for student activities and special events for the school and community. Many hours of planning and thoughtful discussion have taken place in the development of these plans for Phase III.

In keeping with the scheduled timeline, the Board of Trustees, students and community members joined together to celebrate breaking ground this month. We're glad to 'get the ball rolling'!!



This data must reflect the “highly qualified” status of both regular core area teachers and special education teachers at each campus and number of regular and special education classes or core area sections that are taught by highly qualified teachers as of September 16<sup>th</sup> of the current school year.

The chart below reflects the 2015-2016 school year data submitted to the office of No Child Left Behind - Highly Qualified Teacher Compliance Report. The data reflects that each school has 100% of the regular core and special education teachers meeting the definition of being highly qualified and that 100% of all of the core and special education classes and sections are being taught by highly qualified teachers for the 2015-2016 school year.

## ***George West ISD Earns State's Highest Fiscal Accountability Rating***

Once again the George West Independent School District received the state's highest rating under the Texas' School FIRST financial accountability rating system for the 2014-2015 rating year.

This is the 13th year of School FIRST (Financial Accountability Rating System of Texas), a financial accountability system for Texas school districts developed by the Texas Education Agency in response to Senate Bill 875 of the 76th Texas Legislature in 1999.

Major changes to the School FIRST system were implemented by the Texas Education Agency in August 2015 that combined financial indicators with financial solvency indicators, in accordance with House Bill 5, 83rd Texas Legislature, Regular Session, 2013. The primary goal of School FIRST is to achieve quality performance in the management of school districts' financial resources, a goal made more significant due to the complexity of accounting associated with Texas' school finance system.

The Texas Education Agency converted Schools FIRST to a two-tier rating system of either "P" for "Pass" or "F" for "Substandard Achievement" for the 2014-2015 rating year. Prior to the 2014-2015 rating year, the Schools FIRST accountability rating system assigned one of four financial accountability ratings to Texas school districts, with the highest being "Superior Achievement," followed by "Above-Standard Achievement," "Standard Achievement" and "Substandard Achievement." George West ISD achieved the rating of "Superior Achievement" for the 2013-2014 rating year and the previous eleven years.

"We are pleased with the George West ISD's School FIRST rating," said George West ISD Superintendent Ty Sparks. It shows that George West ISD's schools are accountable not only for student learning, but also for achieving these results cost-effectively and efficiently."



**Raising Respectful Children** – When your child hears the word “respect”, what does he/she think? Explain that by being considerate of others’ feelings, letting people know he/she appreciates them, or taking care of belongings, he/she is showing respect.

**Respect for yourself** – Your child has heard the advice to treat others as he/she wants to be treated. If he/she respects himself/herself, following this advice will be easier. Children who have self-respect are also more likely to resist peer pressure. Here are some ways for your child to practice self-respect:

**\*Know yourself:** Ask your child what he/she does well or is proud of. Recognizing his/her traits and accomplishments will boost his/her self-respect.

**\*Ignore put-downs:** Teach your child not to react to a student who makes fun of him/her or calls him/her names. It can be hard to say nothing and walk away, but your child will respect himself/herself afterward. Tip: Role-play this at home so he/she will feel more comfortable.

**\*Stay healthy:** Encourage your child to take care of himself/herself. Part of self-respect is keeping his/her body healthy and strong by exercising, eating nutritious foods, and avoiding harmful substances like drugs and cigarettes.


**\*Do your best:** When your child works hard in school, he/she demonstrates self-respect. Taking advantage of every chance to learn shows that he/she cares about his/her own success.


There will be much joyful singing and listening in the weeks ahead for students at GW Primary and Elementary!

## Cooperative Cross-Curricular Connections

(Alliteration is always awesome.)

Eighth grade students at George West Junior High benefit greatly from the teamwork that takes place amongst their teachers. The district's initiative to bring writing into core content areas is working well. Teachers in the core areas have students write in their classes to focus on the application element of learning while honing basic writing skills. After the content teachers grade the assignments, they pass the assignments to the ELA teacher who then grades for grammar and mechanics.

Ms. Hall, who teaches science, has introduced "Writing Wednesday" into her lesson plans. Bi-weekly writing activities are done in class to encourage students to apply their knowledge of science concepts. One example of this required students to create a scenario about a safety situation that would require use of a fire blanket, a fire extinguisher or the eye-wash station. Students were able to write creatively about rules that keep them safe during labs.



In math class, students write weekly. They use words to explain formulas and processes that normally only involve numbers and letters, as well as explaining the "why" and "how" of math concepts. Mrs. Feist creates interesting writing prompts that can be completed with one or two paragraphs. If students can explain a concept, their retention will be greater. Many students explain topics well enough that Mrs. Sehlke feels like a math genius after reading their paragraphs.

U.S. History students are also writing. In a class typically considered a lecture format, Coach Hicks allows students to expand their thoughts in creative ways. Recently, students wrote an essay explaining their theory on the missing colony of Roanoke. The world may never know what happened to those early settlers, but some students had interesting ideas. Luckily, none involved extra-terrestrials. His students are currently reading the Newberry Award winner My Brother Sam is Dead. He will incorporate writing activities into this unit on the Revolutionary War. Students will take AR quizzes and Literacy Skills tests over the novel for their ELA class.

Tech Apps not only teaches students basic keyboarding and use of programs such as Word, StoryBoard, and Tux Paint, but Ms. Clark supports all other teachers by giving students school time and access to technology for completing assignments in other classes. In ELA, students use Reading Plus and Study Island. One day a week in Tech Apps, students have time to work on these programs.

Teams are important on the gridiron and the court, but the most effective teams are at work in the classrooms at George West Junior High. Creating academic stars who are able to build their brains through training in all areas and in all classes will ensure stronger students for the next level, as well as improve state mandated test scores.

## ***Turning Harsh Self-Talk into Positive Belief Statements***

Have you ever heard the term “*You are your own worse critic?*” Well I am here to tell you that it is true! I recently noticed that anytime someone complements me, I quickly come up with a statement about how I just got lucky. I never seem to say, “Thanks, I worked really hard on that!” Our students are often the same way. They feel that if they fail, the activity just isn’t worth trying. Perhaps we are so hard on ourselves because we take humility too far. Whatever the reason, it is becoming more and more difficult to accept a complement and to stop placing unreal demands on ourselves and our families. STOP THE INSANITY! Learn to accept both a compliment and constructive criticism to better yourself (and your family).

Diane Morris Jones, a speaker I recently heard at a counseling conference, has a way to interrupt our negative thought process and alter our responses. STOP, BREATHE, BELIEVE is her simple program to help us deal with the pressures we place on ourselves and our children. It helps us take time to adjust our negative self-thoughts.

It is time we all take a moment to INTERRUPT THE NEGATIVE THOUGHT PROCESS AND ALTER THE RESPONSE! Here are the three easy steps in the process:

**STOP** – Become aware of the negative statements you are making about yourself or your family (“I stink at Math”)

**BREATHE** – in for 10 counts and out for 10 counts (continue for 3 minutes or so).

**BELIEVE** – Restate your original thought into something else (“I don’t understand this math concept. I bet if I take it in pieces, look at my notes and ask someone, I will begin to feel more confident.”) Believe in yourself and choose healthy thoughts.

For Example:

Rather than: *“There is no way I will finish in time. I have too much homework and my friends keep texting me!”*

A Healthy Response Would Be:

*“I have more homework than usual. I had better get started and take one at a time so I can text my friends later.”*

Rather than: *“Everyone else on Facebook and Snap Chat is holding together just fine. They are even getting to go on date night without the kids! Why can’t I have some time to myself?”*

A healthy response would be:

*“I need a few minutes to myself. I will ask the girl down the street to watch the kids so we can go out to dinner. That way, tomorrow when my son has a game, I will be ready to cheer for him.”*

Rather than: *“I have to keep a calendar with all of my daughter’s activities. If I didn’t, she would never remember what to do when. Her teachers want her to take responsibility for her actions – like that will ever happen!”*

A healthy response might sound like this:


*“My daughter has a full schedule. We can keep a family calendar along with her own calendar. If she forgets something important, we will use that as a teachable moment and learn together. If she cannot keep up with everything maybe she is in too many activities.”*

Teaching our children to cope with the pressures of school, extracurricular activities, and busy social lives while maintaining a good grade average is tough. Hopefully together, we can all take time to refocus negative thoughts and ease the demands of a hectic life.

Remember to **STOP, BREATHE, BELIEVE!!!!**





In 2008, GWISD developed a comprehensive 3-Phase Master Plan that would allow all of the identified facility improvements for the District to be prioritized and implemented with three separate bond projects. Approval of Phase I of this plan, in 2008, produced various upgrades and new facilities addressing the greatest needs on each campus. Phase II, in 2011, constructed a new high school instructional facility. Intentionally, the District asked the voters to focus on the most urgent instructional needs early in the bond process.

Phase III will now provide for a new band hall and gymnasium at the high school. Also included, will be a new classroom wing for the elementary school to replace the aging exterior north wing and provide better security for the campus. Additionally, the plan includes improvement for the main cafeteria, the primary school cafeteria, and upgrades to the sidewalks and disabled seating at the football stadium.

The new Student Activity Center, adjacent to the high school, will include a new performance stage, sound system and theater lighting. This center will be used for student activities and special events for the school and community. Many hours of planning and thoughtful discussion have taken place in the development of these plans for Phase III.
